From the Rector

Welcome to the middle of summer, the month of July and the first third of the longgreen Season after Pentecost! The 81st General Convention of the Episcopal Church, GC81, met in Louisville, Kentucky for an action-packed six days of business (Jun 23-28), preceded by two days of necessary work that did not "count" as part of the convention itself. The Triennial Meeting of the Episcopal Church Women (ECW) was held concurrently with GC81, as has been done for 50 years! ECW celebrated 150 years of service to the Episcopal Church. In the several days before GC81, other groups, such as the Union of Black Episcopalians, also met. .

Episcopalians from around the world attended GC81, Taiwan, Liberia, the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe, as well as Deputies (lay persons and clergy elected by their diocesan conventions) from every state in the US, Puerto Rico and Guam, and about 150 Bishops. The Official Youth Presence (OYP), 18 young people (two each from nine Provinces of TEC), ages 16-19, had seat and voice at GC81. In addition to the ECW, OYP, GC81 Deputies and Bishops, family members and friends, at least 150 organizations—also from around the world-had information and retail booths at the Convention. Groups and individuals familiar to Trinity Church members were among them: Episcopal Relief and Development, Jeff Wunro Designs, Thistle Farms, Church Pension Group, C.M. Almay, American Friends of the Episcopal Church of Sudan, and the Episcopal Church in the Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East (where our Good Friday Offering goes every year). Ecumenical church leaders from around the world also attended and observed GC81.

This was my eighth GC—24 years representing the Diocese of Missouri in what our prayer book calls, "your share in the councils of the Church." I had the title, *Senior Deputy*, and a yellow ribbon at the bottom of my name tag to prove it. Sometimes I felt wise and useful; other times I felt outdated. The most-senior *Senior Deputy* was at his 16th GC, twice as long as I have served. Our deputation represented a range of ages and experience at GC, including three first-time deputies, one aged early 30s and one early 80s. We benefitted from the range of perspectives and experience we brought to our roles as we did the work of the GC81.

The bulk of our work involved resolutions on everything from church disciplinary canons (Title IV), revisions to the BCP, additions and revisions to the Lesser Feasts and Fasts, and heated conversations on a range of issues, including the horrors in Palestine and Israel and the role of the church in indigenous boarding schools. We kept the Chaplain of the HoD very busy, with frequent requests for prayer, in addition to the prayers already planned. We created the Missionary Diocese of Navajoland. No longer a missionary district, Navajoland will be able to choose its own bishop. The tree dioceses in Wisconsin-Eau Claire, Fond du Lac, and Milwaukee—are now reunited into one diocese, Wisconsin; and the Dioceses of Eastern and Western Michigan are now one, the Diocese of the Great Lakes, two specifically, Huron and Michigan.

Added to *Lesser Feasts and Fasts*, our calendar of saints: Harriet Tubman, Queen Liliu'okalani, the Right Rev. Barbara C. Harris. In addition, the calendar was revised to spread the observance dates across the year.

GC81 was a mix of tension and joy, hard work and deepened relationships. I was graduated from Seabury-Western Theological Seminary in 1984. I was able to see fellow Seabury people, including the current Bishop of Kentucky, Terry White, and Ruth Myers, HOD vice-presidential candidate, professor at Church Divinity School of the Pacific, both of whom were a year behind me in seminary. One more highlight: my sister, Amy Nykamp, was a first-time lay Deputy from the Diocese of Northern California. It was such a privilege to share the experience of GC81 with her.

PRAYER is an integral part for us to have as we maintain a personal relationship with God through Jesus Christ. Our Catechism, page 856 in BCP, says, "Prayer is responding to God, by thought and by deeds, with or without words." We pray in Church as a Community together as the Body of Christ; we pray away from Church at home, at work, when we are in crisis, or thankful, and all through the day and night. Prayer gives us contentment as it brings us Hope, Peace, Joy and Love. As Episcopalians, we tend to be shy about our prayer needs, but we should remember that Jesus Christ says that we are to share our burdens and joys with those in our Community, and that is why we have a Healing Service on the second Sunday of each month; the Prayer Box in the Narthex for any of us to put a prayer request in it for someone to

pray for you; and we are now offering after each Worship Service to have one of our Prayer Ministers to pray with anyone who needs a little private time with someone to pray with them.

We are all invited and encouraged not to be shy or embarrassed to seek help when needed. All Prayer requests are kept CONFIDENTIAL, so no need to worry that your request will be broadcast to any and everyone. We look forward to serving you in your time of need or joy, as we follow in Jesus' footsteps to care for all God's People.

We continue to pray for rain, sunshine and willing hands!




News from Small Group Ministry
