



**Ashley Bunton** is our babysitter. When the Nursery is open—which it has for most of 2023, Ashley staffs the Parish Nursery each Sunday from 7:45 AM until after the second service. She provides a safe and warm environment for our children, ages 0 – four (and older).

In 2020, Ashely began her regular duties with enthusiasm and love. Then the church building closed—and, as we well know, did not reopen in 2020. In June 2021, Ashley, Tara Leitch, Erin Shetler, and Amy Shetler gave the Nursery a thorough cleaning, disinfecting, rearrangement, and evaluation (purging) of toys. That massive effort was in expectation of reopening in the summer with the ability to use the Nursery space for childcare. As we know, thanks to COVID-19 variant (Delta) that did not happen either! Things looked good for an Advent re-gathering, if not in the Nursery itself, in a larger space where the children could spread out safely. Before we could reopen-again, in 2022, we had to move all the stored furniture and other "stuff" that was moved in there when we began the renovation in the church. Then Ashley had to do another major cleaning! The Nursery has been open since.





### John Hawn

In February of 2022, I returned to Trinity after completing a five-year Music Ministry at St. John UCC in Collinsville, IL. While there I administered a diverse music program consisting of Adult Choir, Children's Choir, Bell Choir, produced Children's programs, Christmas Choral programs and a large organ rebuild project by the Wicks Organ Company, which was completed during the Pandemic. Also, during this time my "day job" was in the O'Fallon, IL school district as an aide in the pre-school program.

**Elizabeth (Betty) Bowen** is our "officially retired Deacon" (March 9, 2014), but then, who retires from living out the Gospel! Betty continues to help where needed in our Worship Services and continues to preach on Maundy Thursday and whenever the need arises. Betty is committed to her 'Servant Ministry' because that is the ministry of a Deacon; she continues to help with the Share A Meal Program and is now an Honorary Member of the GIVING GARDEN. Betty encourages others to look outside the church to offer Love, Hope and Hospitality to those in the St Charles Community, such as to the international students at Lindenwood University, and the Share A Meal Program when Trinity serves lunch 4 times a year to those in need. Betty saw the need for people to get together to share stories about their faith and so became the birth of a Small Group Ministry which is now going into its third year; and has had a successful turnout with all the Studies. With the help of Father Michael, Lori Cooper and Carolyn Stuhlsatz, there is now a Prayer Ministry at Trinity. Betty continues to serve as Deacon to the Bishop on his visitation to

Churches without a Deacon. Betty is also serving on two Committees in the Diocese – The Church Architecture & Allied Arts, and the newly formed Gathering Space Feasibility Taskforce. As she tries to slow down and after 16 years as Deacon, Betty has stated that while there is breath in her body, she will continue to serve God where needed.

*In January 2023, Fr. Michael wrote this bio for the Annual Report:* Time flies fast. I have been here for a quarter of a year already. I joined Trinity Church after one year working as a parish priest Calvary Church/Louisiana, MO, and St. John's Church/Eolia, MO. I was born and raised in Tanzania. After high school I studied Biblical studies for two years (Msalato Theological College), Higher certificate in Biblical and cross-Cultural Studies (All Nations Christian College in the United Kingdom), bachelor's degree in mass communication (St. Paul University in Kenya), Masters in Community Development (Dodoma University in Tanzania), master's in theological studies (Eden Theological Seminary, Webster Groves, MO). Currently I am enrolled in a Doctor of Ministry program at the School of Theology, University of the South, Sewanee, TN.



I was ordained in 2010, I have worked as parish priest, a chaplain at Dodoma University in Tanzania, a book publisher for the Anglican Church of Tanzania, National Coordinator for Integrity of Creation in Tanzania for the Christian Council of Tanzania, and I, with my wife, Jemima, we run a small Vocational Training Center in Dodoma, Tanzania. God has blessed my wife and me with four kids, Chiha, Liyeko, Witumbilo and Motesswa, three of them are grown up and the last born, Motesswa, is still in high school—she is still with us as our baby.

I enjoy reading books, walking, seeing nature, fishing, and enjoying talk to different people and exchanging ideas and I love history of the world and the Church. I am happy to be part of Trinity and all the ministries we have embarked on.

#### Addendum to Michael Nchimbi's Bio for the Year 2023

In August 2022, right before Fr. Michael officially joined us at Trinity Church, his oldest child, daughter Chiha, was married in Tanzania. Unable to get the proper visa, Fr. Michael had to watch the service and celebrations on What's App video. In July 2023, his first grandchild was born. Chiha and her husband named their son Darren. Here in the United States, Michael contributed greatly to the life and ministries of Trinity Church. He preached regularly, led Bible study, and pitched in wherever he saw a need. When His wife, Jemima came to visit in March 2023, the two led three presentations to Adult Forum about the Vocational Training School they had started in Tanzania not too long before Michael came to the U.S. to study at Eden Seminary. When Jemima came to visit, they had not seen each other in person in more than four years, during which time, Jemima had run the school, recruited teachers and students, and had begun implementing plans to build their own buildings. (The Diocese of Tanzania, from which they rented space, required its return.) When he returned to Tanzania in late October 2023, Fr. Michael had not been home nor seen his children in person in five years.

In 2023, Fr. Michael worked with Deacon Betty to expand Trinity's relationship with international students at Lindenwood University and establish a recognized campus ministry. Because of significant hurdles and hoops, that effort did not succeed; however, Lindenwood international students do know where and who we are, and like us for the food and fun, if nothing else! At this point, further diocesan funding for campus ministry at Lindenwood is on hold. In Bible study, Michael both delighted and challenged the members of the group. On the diocesan level, Michael represented Jackson Kemper Convocation on Diocesan Council and encouraged Mtippe Kogani, also from Tanzania, to establish "Grace African Christian Connections" at Christ Church Cathedral. That group moved to St. Barnabas' Church in Florissant in July, meeting weekly on Sunday afternoons, rather than monthly on Saturdays. Also in 2023, Fr. Michael met regularly with the Vestry and challenged that group to remember that they are, first and foremost, leaders—elders—of the congregation (chronological age notwithstanding), far more than a corporate board with its focus finance above mission. Fr. Michael continued his summer Doctor of Ministry classes in Tennessee. In his own curiosity and willingness to listen invited us own stories, but listening to us share our stories, not only with each other, but with those who come to us—and to listen hard.

#### Tamsen Whistler

Thank you for the gift of another year in ministry with Trinity Church as your Rector! It's hard to believe that 2023 was our 28th year together! When Bob and I and Will arrived in 1995, Will was 16 months old. He began the Year 2023 with his 29th birthday (Jan 1). Two days later, I entered a new decade, celebrating with Trinity Church in a special coffee hour after each service on January 8, organized by my sisters, Helena, and Amy—here from Sonoma County, CA—and cheering Bob's Jan 10 birthday, too. (In honor of my big birthday, I bought myself a shirt: I Survived the 60's—Twice!)

As a spiritual discipline, and as continuing education, I joined a 12-week online course introducing the Enneagram. Our leader was from the Church of St. Michael



and St. George/Clayton. We had participants from coast to coast from a variety of backgrounds, vocations, and religious traditions. Ask me about the Enneagram when you have a little time. I found the course fascinating and enriching, an excellent Lenten discipline—and I have much more to learn!

Bob and I were able to travel to California to visit my sisters and their families, my stepmother, and one of Bob's first cousins. Bob and I, my sister Amy, and her husband John made the trip Bob has been wanting to make for most of our marriage—a visit to Yosemite National Park. The park was spectacular, even more so than I remember from family visits years ago. Bob loved it. We plan return and spend more time! The day after we visited Yosemite, we visited two cemeteries in Fresno, one, where my great-great grandparents are buried; one where my great-grandparents and their two daughters, my grandmother and my great-aunt are buried, as well as my father's younger brother, my uncle. It was a powerful experience to stand there, knowing that Amy and I represented a fifth generation of our father's family, and our children, a sixth, connecting generations long before us and all I hope will come after us—a microcosm of the Communion of Saints.

In November, Bob and I celebrated 40 years of marriage with a great meal, a new tie-tack for him, and a new dress for me. We were married in the chapel at Seabury-Western Seminary in 1983—here we are all these years later in St. Charles, Missouri, full of ups and downs and gratitude. We thank you for your part—the Trinity Church community—in shaping and supporting us in our commitment to each other.

In December, we travelled to Richmond, Virginia, for Will's college graduation. His journey started at Missouri S&T in 2012 with a major in aerospace engineering. He was graduated magna cum laude from Virginia Commonwealth University on Dec 8 with two bachelor's degrees, one in Cultural Anthropology and another in Financial Engineering Technology. The proud parents were there, and Chelsea, and Chelsea's mother, Peggy, to cheer him on. Two days later, in the middle of his graduation party, Will announced, "Gather round, everybody. ## Rector's Address to the 2023 Annual Parish Meeting (Sermon and Report on the Year 2022) January 29, 2023

Those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles. They will run and not be weary; they will walk and not be faint. Isaiah 40:31 NIV

About three weeks ago, I wrote a reflection for the Vestry meeting. I began it with the verse from Isaiah 40:31 that I just read aloud, from the New International Version of the Bible, because that is the version quoted on the poster in the church office. I invite you to go look at it when you have an opportunity.

For a portion of this address, I'm going to be quoting myself—similar to repeating myself, I guess, but at least I'm doing it on purpose. I ask you to bear with me, because I think some what I wrote then and later sent out in the Mini-Tidings bears repeating, not just to you, bur to myself.

I remind you that I was reviewing the year-end financial reports—the ones for December 2022. As you will hear very soon, the numbers are grim:

So, dear friends, I was reviewing the financial reports for December 2022 and becoming depressed. In my gloom, I was having trouble coming up with a reflection for tonight, the last regular Vestry meeting before the 2023 Annual Meeting. If we just look at the numbers, things look pretty bad—deficit, deficit, deficit.

I walked out of my office into Michelle's with the intention of burying my sorrows in popcorn and chocolate. I looked up, as I always do when I walk into the office toward the copier (and the food) and took a good look at the eagle poster on the wall above the copier. A bald eagle is flying under cloudy skies, with just the hint of blue, and an even fainter hint of a wispy cloud or the remnant of a rainbow. I read the words on this poster often, but I realized this afternoon that I wasn't actually reading it; I was beginning where it began and then going on with a more familiar translation. I'm used to "wait upon the Lord" and either "rise up" or "mount up" with wings like eagles. The NIV here says, "hope," and "soar."

Both hope and soar struck me as particularly powerful words today, more lively, energetic words than wait upon and rise up. Hope is an active form of waiting; soaring is a glorious form of rising on updrafts and floating. Both hoping and soaring require that we decide to act. We must choose to hope; we must engage our wings to soar. We make these choices, trusting that the Lord provides the wind in which we can soar with the eagle and the assurance of hope for the people who think there is none.

Trinity Church is far more than the financial reports that show us in deficit. The choices we have made that have put us in our current financial position are choices for life and growth, hope, and the wings to soar into the third decade of the 21st Century. Taking risks in response to the work of the Holy Spirit is what we have done and what we are called to do. If we look at all of Isaiah 40, we see hopelessness and fear, suffering and separation. We see, too, God's enduring promise. If we make our choices prayerfully, in response to the call of God to serve God's people, to engage in God's mission to the world; if we seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit as disciples of Jesus Christ, we will continue to take the big risks, hope in the Lord, and soar. It is not and will not be easy; it will be good.

The worship space we have just renovated was essentially unchanged for sixty years—and that space, this building, was built in 1961 with great risk and great hope. In 1961, in our building at Clark and Benton Streets—a building we occupied for ninety years—our Vestry faced what looked like an impossible choice, to close for lack of resources or take the risk to move. The financial situation was bordering on desperate, and they had no more room to grow. Hoping against hope, the Vestry chose to act. They flapped their wings and chose to soar. They took the risk to build a new church. Details fell into place that made it clear that their decision to take that risk was the right decision. It wasn't easy; finances stayed shaky for a long time; but they did it. They trusted God to provide. We affirm that trust today.

Ongoing flexibility in furniture arrangement and conduct of worship in our reconfigured space—note that three big events in June required three different configurations, all beautiful and each unique, never to be seen exactly as they were again! Creative pivoting has become a way of life!

Providing a variety of formation opportunities for children and youth, Sunday

school in some format, certainly, but also other days and other forms of fellowship, service, and growing as Christian disciples Stewardship

Increasing understanding that everything we are and have and give

Rebuilding a Solid Financial Foundation.

And one more thing ahead to add to moving into our future:

Turning 70 is a big deal for me, personally, and it is lovely to have shared that milestone with you just about three weeks ago. My turning 70 is significant for all of us, however, as retirement age for Episcopal priests and bishops is age 72.

Unlike an airline pilot, I do not automatically have to retire on my birthday. With the permission of the Bishop at the request of the Vestry, I can delay that date. I would very much like to do so, because NOT to do so will be to miss a couple of milestones that, God willing, I really want to be able to share with the people of Trinity Church. On Feb 24, 2025, I will celebrate the 40th anniversary of my ordination to the priesthood. On May 1, 2025, we—all of us, this congregation, and my family and I—will mark 30 years of ministry in St. Charles, Missouri together. I don't want to miss that day; I don't want to miss Feb. 24 before it. And I don't want to turn in my keys that day either.

The Vestry and I will be discussing how we might best "do" this thing. We will have conversation with the Bishop and the Canon to the Ordinary; Bob and I will have to be involved together in some of the logistics; but the biggest work for Trinity Church begins now and continues, possibly for at least a couple of years, after I leave.

In the meantime, we have plenty to do as we minister together in St. Charles. With gratitude for the Year 2022, we move forward into 2023. May we hope and soar! —TEW

# Junior Warden (People's Warden) Report to the 2024 Annual Meeting for the Year 2023

Work on various projects throughout the church continues on an ad hoc basis. The main projects are listed below. Parking lot lighting still needs to be addressed.

#### **New Computers**

Several new computers were acquired during the year, replacing outdated systems used by Michelle, John, Michael, and Jacob/Vestry. The Jackson-Kemper room was slightly reorganized with an improved

space for finance. The new computer is internet connected and will permit the Treasurer to work either at the church or at home running the new financial software – QuickBooks for Non-Profit.

#### New Shed

This has been a busy year with the best change being the replacement of the old shed with the new Community Garden shed. We had significant help with the demolition of the old shed by garden partners in Chesterfield and O'Fallon. The new shed was pre-built by Cook Portable Warehouses and purchased locally.

#### **New Lights**

Several of the ceiling lights in the Welcome space have been replaced with LED panels and additional replacements are planned. One fixture in the upstairs hallway was also replaced with an LED panel. The plan is to replace all the fluorescent fixtures with LEDs, which will reduce our electricity bills. It is a challenge to replace these fixtures due to the age of the building and how it was built. It seems each light that has been replaced brings about new challenges.

The Nominating Committee each year is supposed to include all retiring Vestry members and three-at large members elected to staggered terms, one per year, at the Annual Parish Meeting.

At the Annual Meeting January 30, 2022 we elected Barbara Gossow to serve as an at-large member of the Nominating Committee for a three-year term, ending Jan 2025. The Vestry, with the Rector, is the governing body of a parish church. Trinity's Vestry meets on the Second Thursday of the month, generally excepting July. Diocesan Canons: "The Vestry shall take charge of the property of the Parish; attend to and regulate all its temporal concerns; provide for the support of the Rector, and, in the case of the Rector's death, resignation or removal, supply, with the Bishop's advice and consent, the Rector's place as soon as possible. The Vestry shall also assist the Rector in the proclamation of the Gospel, the public worship of the Congregation, the nurture of persons of all ages, the alleviation of human suffering and promotion of justice ... "
