FROM THE PRIEST-IN-CHARGE

Dear Friends,

Blessings in the middle of the 50 Days of Easter! Blessings in Eastertide! On Sunday, May 4, we celebrated 30 years as Priest and Parish, an amazing milestone and a wonderful day—who knew in 1995 that we would be able to put up with each other for 30 years!! According to Hallmark, 30 is the "pearl" anniversary, so our ushers at both services handed out faux pearl necklaces for everyone to wear—like Mardi Gras beads—for the day. The beads were lighthearted symbols of our shared years of ministry.

We celebrated Holy Eucharist, the meal our Savior Jesus Christ provides us week by week. At 9 AM, several of us attended an excellent forum offered by Michael Fowlkes, member of Trinity Church in the Central West End (St. Louis). He presented a workbook that he and his sister have written on preparations and details we can provide for those who deal with our estates after we die. (If you want to purchase the workbook, A Season of Transition, we can order them through Michael Fowlkes for \$15 each, or you can go to Amazon and find it.)

After worship, we continued our celebration in the Parish Hall with all kinds of delicious food and lots of fun. We had cupcakes decorated with edible pearls, "pearlized" ballons in centerpieces on our tables, green and gold and blue colors throughout the room. People from each table shared memories, recent and distant of our relationship as pastor and parish in the last 30 years—not as a long string, but interwoven, a beautiful web, a net of pearls connecting all of us.

The only regret I have for that wonderful day is that we did not take group photos after each service on the "porch" of the church; and at the meal, photos of current and former junior and senior wardens, current and former Vestry members, former search committee members, the four clergy present—all of whom have served or are serving Trinity Church—and of everyone squished in the parish hall, wearing our faux pearls and our smiles for posterity. We will just have to hold these memories without photographic evidence!

On the walls in the church, we have added two timelines and re-attached our Trinity Grows tree. The shorter timeline—18 feet—starts in 1836 and extends to 2036 (2036 ...), reflecting our current 189 years and moving into the future. Each year is equal to one inch. The second timeline, below the first, is 28 feet long and represents the past 30 years, 1995-2005, with 27 feet marked, each year equal to nine inches. (If this were a map, the 30-year section would be a magnification of 30 inches from the 189 inches to date). We are building the timelines together, with photos and events, not only for the past 30 years, but with notes on the 189-year timeline, showing our history and moving forward into the future. Keep bringing in photos as you find them.

On the wall opposite the timelines, between two Trinity banners, we have re-hung The Trinity Grows tree. The large tree still includes photos and lists of spiritual gifts, but we will be adding "leaves" with short answers to these questions: What is your favorite tree at Trinity Church? Why is this tree important to you? Everyone is invited to share in this—and if you have a friend or a child or a grandchild who cannot easily write out what they want to say, or who cannot come to church, please write it down or type it for them and put it on the tree. Like the timelines, the Trinity Tree stories are an ongoing project. Although it feels like a long time for many of us, 30 years is just over 1/6 of our 189-year history, more than ten times the lives of our youngest parishioners, but less than a third of the lives of our nonagenarian members!

A Season of Transition





May 25: Special Rogation **Processions** After each service

The word "rogation" comes from the Latin, *rogare*, which means, "ask." Traditional Rogation Days in The Episcopal Church are the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before the Feast of the Ascension. Rogation Days began in the Fifth Century in France, with prayers and fasting to ward off a volcanic disaster. They continued in the Middle Ages with prayers in fields to protect newly planted crops in hopes of a bountiful harvest. In England, in the late Ninth Century (800's), Rogation processions included not only prayers for crops, but also an activity called, "Beating the Bounds." Once a year in the spring, the parish priest would lead a procession around the edges of all the property in the area. According to one source, the reason for this was to mark in the minds of the younger people where the boundaries were—boundary stones or posts not always in place and maps almost never available. So, the people "beat the bounds" with willow sticks. They also, apparently, sometimes used the willow sticks to beat the boys who were part of the procession—to instill in them a vivid physical memory of the parish boundaries. Queen Elizabeth I eliminated the beatings in the 16th C. In the Episcopal Church, Rogation Processions frequently take place, as ours does, on Sundays after the service of Holy Eucharist and before the Dismissal.
